#### KO WAI TĀTOU - WHO WE ARE

The Northern Wairoa Kāhui Ako consists of ten schools in the Northern Wairoa area. They include schools in rural and isolated rural areas. There are also eight ECE service providers who are part of the Northern Wairoa Kāhui Ako.

The Kāhui Ako consists of one secondary school (Year 9 to 13), two contributing primary schools and six full primary schools. Dargaville High School also has responsibility of the Alternate Learning Centre, based in Dargaville.

Geographically the Kāhui Ako is widely spread. There is at least 120 kilometres between the most isolated schools, almost two hours travel. Many meetings are based in Dargaville which is about an hour's drive for two of the schools.

# **COLLABORATIVE INQUIRY**

#### How did we arrive at our achievement challenges?

The schools and ECE providers of the Northern Wairoa Kāhui Ako have a collaborative relationship, which very quickly arrived at having a collective responsibility for the success and outcomes of all learners across the schools in our community. For our first set of achievement challenges, a common goal was recognised, and all agreed that wellbeing would be a key area of focus. Consequently, the goals of well-being, local curriculum and transitions had many aspects of crossover. In reviewing these achievement challenges, the stewardship group have been working collaboratively and this has helped to frame the areas of focus moving forward. As well as seeking ECE input, time was spent at the end of 2022 visiting every school, and meeting with each of the principals individually. Their individual voices were woven into the narrative, as well as the school context, further refining the achievement challenges that have been chosen. Feedback was sought for the draft achievement challenges before submission to the Ministry of Education.

# OUR SHARED APPROACH TO IMPROVEMENT

From the outset, with the formation of the Kāhui Ako, working collaboratively and being able to share has been key to the way the group has been able to move forward with developing our achievement challenges. Quickly, well-being was established as a key focus that we all agreed would engage our students and strengthen relationships through and beyond the learning journey.

As the Kāhui Ako is quite spread geographically, bringing principals and staff together to share experiences and support each other has been an important aspect of the Kāhui Ako. For instance, all teachers from Kāhui Ako schools came together late January 2021 for a Teacher Only Day to launch the Relationships First PLD. This day included a keynote speaker from Professor Russell Bishop as well as follow-up workshops and a presentation about local histories and pūrākau.

During 2021 there were regular combined staff meetings for PLD as well as regular PLD included in the Principal hui. During times of lockdown, PLD was provided online and recorded to be available to staff widely.
